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

2017 Is Going to Be Another Exciting Year for the Chamber and Our Community

There is no better investment for a business or professional firm than membership in the Aberdeen Area Chamber of Commerce. We work to connect member businesses in Aberdeen and across the county. Acting as the voice for Ab-

erdeen business for over 130 years, the Chamber represents over 650 members. For 2017, your board of directors and staff have developed the following goals and priorities:

Membership Objectives

We will further strengthen our relationships with members by increasing interaction, communicating benefits of membership, and providing education on issues affecting them. With that in mind, here are the objectives for 2017.

- Membership growth of 5-10% and retention rate of 95%
- Increase retention and engagement by scheduling one-on-one meetings with Chamber members and board members throughout the year.
- Increase awareness among members of available benefits, committees, meetings and events through enhanced promotional efforts and better communication.
- Effectively engage past volunteers, board members, and Leadership Aberdeen alumni within committees and events to keep them retained in the community.

Organizational Objectives

We continuously work to evaluate our organization and its events, efforts, programs, committees to meet the needs of membership and the community. For 2017 we will:

Implement "Board Hosts" at Chamber events, meetings and programs to encourage greater board participation and interaction with membership.

- Print Annual Chamber Report in Membership Directory and Resource Guide to be distributed to membership by end of 1st quarter.
- Combine the Annual Banquet/ Meeting with Chamber Week for one annual celebration week in April with free appreciation event for members.
- Implement a Chamber Testimonial Campaign to market the Chamber more effectively and build on our reputation to include "Why I Did It" testimonials and "Chamber Chats" through website and social media.
- Implement new software to effectively manage membership information and financial processes as well as tracking engagement of members and volunteers.
- Evaluate Chamber building usage and potential for additional community space.

Committee Task Force Objectives

In an effort to increase volunteer engagement and outreach to our Members, the Aberdeen Area Chamber of Commerce has established 9 volunteer committees and 3 task forces for 2017.

Any employee of a member business is welcome to join any committee, unless noted, without any obligation, and your level of participation is up to you.

For 2017, each committee/task force will have an annual planning retreat where measurable goals and priorities are established.

NEW The Edge Task Force

Explore. Discover. Grow. Engage. The mission of the task force is to assist Chamber staff with the development of local educational and networking activities and events targeted at young professionals and start-up entrepreneurs; implementation of social media ideas and concepts for the Chamber and community; and coordinating efforts with the Aberdeen Development Corporation and other area organizations working towards common mission.

· NEW Keep It Local Task Force

The mission of the task force is to assist Chamber staff in promoting Aberdeen businesses, resources, and events through collaborative marketing efforts to include promotion of NEW Aberdeen Gift Card and Chamber For Good programs. The group will also work to continue educating the general public about the economic benefits of shopping and buying locally.

NEW Leadership Development Task Force

The mission of the task force will be to evaluate the current Leadership Aberdeen program and discuss additional training opportunities that could be included; develop a scholarship program to offset costs for state-wide leadership opportunities for Aberdeen participants; and to coordinate efforts with other organizations and businesses to grow leadership skills of our citizens and expand leadership training opportunities that will positively impact our community and state.

· Agribusiness Committee

The mission of the Agribusiness Committee is to promote agriculture as a major segment of the local economy, to address and educate the membership on issues important to agriculture, to unite and network groups through ag-related programs and events, and to recognize outstanding achievements in agriculture.

Ambassador Committee

The mission of the Committee is to promote a positive community image and serve as goodwill ambassadors at Chamber and community functions such as ribbon cuttings, new business openings, ground breakings, business relocations, and other networking events. (Committee selection done on a nomination basis). The Ambassadors also host the Community Champions Awards Luncheon.

Diplomat Committee

The mission of the Diplomat Committee is to strengthen membership engagement and retention by visiting current members and facilitating communication to and from members, helping to identify member concerns, and garnering support for the Chamber. (Committee selection is done on a nomination basis). The committee also facilitates the annual ABBY Awards program and raises scholarship funds for the Leadership Aberdeen program.

· Military & Veterans Committee

The mission of the Military & Veterans Committee is to promote a positive working relationship among the community, employers and area military and veterans' groups while heightening awareness of the military and veteran presence and needs in the community.

Workforce & Education Committee

The mission of the Workforce & Education Committee is to facilitate and support activities related to business-education partnerships, youth engagement and workforce recruitment and retention. The committee also addresses educational and training needs of the business community.

Health & Wellness Committee

The mission of the Health & Wellness Committee is to implement business-healthcare partnerships and programs to promote workplace wellness and inspire healthy lifestyle choices through education and initiatives. The committee also produces an annual Health and Wellness Directory for the community.

Government Affairs Committee

The mission of the committee is to open up a dialogue and provide education on a broad range of issues which affect the business community; increase communication and collaboration between business and governmental entities; break down barriers; and advocate to elected officials on the local, state and federal levels.

Partners in Community Pride Committee

The purpose of the Partners in Community Pride Committee is to coordinate projects that serve to beautify the community and enhance our quality of life; educate the public on related issues which affect them such as regulations, codes, and new efforts; and to recognize and promote business and community development projects.

Transportation Committee

The Transportation Committee is the Chamber's primary business voice on transportation issues of importance locally, regionally, and nationally. The committee meets monthly to gather information from transportation experts in all areas of transportation including ground, rail, and air; analyze the information presented and determine how the Aberdeen Chamber can have an impact; and to share pertinent information with business people in the community.

Community Development Objectives

We will champion our community's successes and support issues and opportunities that will improve our community's quality of life and further the growth and development of our region. In 2017 we will:

- Work with the city and other organizations to assist in the development of a community welcome center and welcoming activities and events
- Continue collaborative efforts with the City and County to develop and/or enhance event space to grow and retain BBB tax dollars within the community.

2017 IRS Mileage Rates

The Internal Revenue Service has released Notice 2016-169 announcing the 2017 standard mileage rates.

Taxpayers always have the option of claiming deductions based on the actual costs of using a vehicle rather than the

standard mileage rates.

A taxpayer may not use the business standard mileage rate for a vehicle after claiming accelerated depreciation, including the Section 179

expense deduction, on that vehicle. Likewise, the standard rate is not available to fleet owners (more than four vehicles used simultaneously). Please contact the Aberdeen Eide Bailly office at 225-8783 with questions or for additional information.

New Year, New Healthier You

It's that time of year again! Time to set new goals. Each January, countless Americans set off to make New Year resolutions to either eat more healthfully, lose weight, or exercise more. These are all great goals for our health, but we

may sometimes fall short of following through on our resolutions. This year, let's make it a good one.

Here are a few nutritious tips to help move you toward a healthy 2017:

 Choose MyPlate. MyPlate is a tool to help you create a more balanced diet. Aim to make your plate half fruits and vegetables, a quarter of your plate whole grains and a quarter lean protein, while choosing low-fat or non-fat dairy.

- Cut back on unhealthy fats, added sugars and salt. Foods high in unhealthy fats, added sugars and salt may increase the risk of certain chronic diseases. Select healthier cooking methods such as baked or roasted instead of fried and prepare foods using liquid instead of solid fasts (ex: canola oil vs. butter). Read the labels to choose fresh, frozen, or canned foods without added salt or sugar.
- Be physically active your way.

 Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity each week and perform musclestrengthening exercises on two or more days each week. Choose an activity you enjoy to do. If you enjoy

walking and talking, find a walking buddy. If you don't do something you enjoy, it will be more difficult to stick with it.

- Set realistic goals. This will help you to achieve a healthy eating pattern that emphasizes small shifts toward a healthy lifestyle. Set small goals and work toward them for success!
- **Don't give up.** Nobody is perfect. If you fall off track, remain positive and get back to your new healthy lifestyle.

You may be thinking that you have to make all these changes at once. That is not the case! Remember small changes over time is key. By incorporating the tips provided above, small changes will make a big difference in creating a more energized self and lifestyle throughout the New Year.

The SD Fusion Center and How it Helps Retailers

The South Dakota Fusion Center (SDFC) has launched a new program for retailers to get information about theft and other issues that might be happening around the state and in the region. Why is this important to us? Because some thefts occurring in town are crime rings, and the thieves will travel from city to city committing the same crimes. Aberdeen's Retail Theft Coalition regularly uses the SDFC as a resource at its monthly meetings to alert local retailers about activity that could be moving to our area.

So, just what is the South Dakota Fusion Center? According to their Website, sdfusion.org, the SDFC was established by Executive Order and is a division of the South Dakota Highway Patrol. It is a collaborative project of the South Dakota Department of Public Safety and the South

Dakota Attorney General's Office under the auspices of the South Dakota Highway Patrol and the South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation, respectively. Their mission is to enhance the capability of safety partners by receiving, gathering, analyzing and disseminating criminal intelligence and public safety data in a timely and actionable manner.

Angel Duran, State Trooper with the South Dakota Highway Patrol, spent time at our December meeting explaining the SDFC and how retailers can benefit from the piece of the website built for them, which was launched in October. Retailers can view and post activity or allow employees to access as read only. They can also sign up for updates by going online to sdfusion.org, clicking on 'How to Join' and then 'Organized Retail Crime Alliance - Register'. In

addition to a database of activity, including suspects' photos, there's also a forum where retailers can network with each other. If you have any questions about the SDFC, Officer Michael Law is our local contact at the Aberdeen Police Department. Officer Law can be reached at 626-7000.

In January, the Brown County States Attorney and recently-hired Brown County Victim's Rights Specialist will be addressing Marcy's Law and how it affects retail businesses. The Retail Theft Coalition will temporarily be held the 2nd Thursday of each month at 2:00 p.m. Please note this date and time change. Anyone is welcome to attend. The meetings are held in the Community Room of the Public Safety Building (police department) at 114 2nd Avenue Southeast.

(Jan 23rd-Mar 21st, 2017)



Keeping Things Clean this Winter

'Tis the season, as the saying goes. 'Tis the season to remember to shovel your walks. As a whole, the citizens of Aberdeen do a pretty good job of keeping their walks clean, but there are always a few who don't. Whether it be illness, out of town or just plain lazy, the sidewalks still need to be cleaned. If you don't, the city will help you out, which comes along with a hefty \$150 minimum charge.

Here's how the city code reads: Section 46-338 Noncompliance The owner of any real property fronting or abutting upon any sidewalk shall remove the snow or ice from such sidewalk within 48 hours after the falling of said snow has stopped. If said snow or ice still has not been removed after 48 hours, then the city may cause to be removed said snow or ice and may assess the costs against the real property and certify said assessment to the county



auditor's office for collection.

If code enforcement receives a complaint or sees a sidewalk that has not been shoveled after the first 48 hours, a warning tag will be hung on the home giving the owner 24 hours to shovel the sidewalk. If the walk has not been shoveled in 24 hours, the city will abate the nuisance and charge the property owner the minimum \$150.


It is in the best interest of the community to keep the walks clean for



those who use walking as their mode of transportation or exercise as well as for people in wheelchairs. You also could be held liable for injuries that happen on your property due to neglect. Please remember that if you have a handicap access, it must be thoroughly cleaned including the front access portion (curb cut, etc.), not just piled in front of the access.

Participants will learn skills such as:

- Using your mind to manage your symptoms
- Communicating with friends, family, and providers
- Dealing with anger, depression, and other difficult emotions
- Designing and maintaining a healthy eating and exercise plan
- Managing pain and fatigue
- Goal setting, problem solving, and coping
- Relaxing and stress management skills
- Appropriate use of medications

Christmas "Stuff" Helps the Economy

George Carlin had a great comedic routine about consumerism in which he says that a house is just a place to keep your stuff while you go out and buy more stuff. The holiday season is stuff gathering on steroids. Stuff comes in from friends,

relatives, and co-workers. We don't even have to leave the house except to get stuff for them. Every year people lament about losing the 'true' meaning of the season but actually buying more stuff is one of the greatest things that we can do for the economy. If it weren't for consumers and their purchases we'd be back in the dark ages literally.

Frank Trentmann, a professor of history at London University, specializes in the history of consumption. His book, "Empire of Things: How

We Became a World of Consumers", relates the 500 year history of buying more and more stuff. Around the 1500's, well before the Industrial Revolution, income in northern Europe had risen to the level that large numbers of non-noble class people had enough disposable income to buy jeweled knives, books, fancy furniture and similar luxuries. Stuff that they did not need but which made them feel better.

In addition to increased disposable income, urbanization with city streets lined with shops and the discovery of the Americas with its novelties of coffee, tobacco, sugar, and chocolate exploded the desire for stuff to drink, smoke, and eat. In 1650 England had one coffee shop in the entire country. Fifty years later every major city in Europe had hundreds.

This does not mean that conspicuous consumption was socially acceptable. Rather it was a challenge to the ideas prevalent from Plato to St. Augustine to the Renaissance


> Church that condemned the pursuit of things as wicked because it corrupted the soul and diverted attention from the afterlife. Until well into the 18th century most European states and the Americas had "sumptuary laws" which limited the type and amount of stuff that could

be acquired. The Venetian senate of 1512 stipulated that no more than 6 forks and knives could be given as a wedding gift. Gilded chests and mirrors were forbidden outright. James I tried to ban tobacco in England. Many European countries banned the lower classes from buying expensive clothes. German women could be fined or imprisoned for wearing a jaunty scarf.

To the rulers and moralists of the time limiting the population's purchases made sense because times were hard. A farthing spent on a bauble was one less available to spend on a bowl of gruel. According to Trentmann, things changed when trade opened the world. As Europe, China, the Middle East, and the Americas traded with one another a virtuous, sustaining cycle of ever increasing goods replaced the old subsistence economies. The world of goods expanded in dramatic and unprecedented ways. People could have their gruel and their trinkets too. Coupled with the Industrial Revolution consumers were finally off to the markets.

People, Adam Smith observed, were buying "little conveniences" like tweezer cases and inlaid snuff boxes not because of their practicality but because they were "a means of happiness". So today, we continue to go out and get more stuff not because we need to but because we want to make ourselves or our recipients happy. I hope you made yourself and your loved ones happy this holiday season. Hopefully you helped the economy too by buying more stuff.







Pregnancy and Workplace Rights

It has been illegal to discriminate against pregnant women in the workplace since the Pregnancy Discrimination Act was passed in 1978. However, even today government agencies receive over 5,000 complaints per year of alleged

pregnancy discrimination in the workplace. The most common complaint is employers firing or laying off an employee because she became pregnant. Employers may believe that they are protecting the health of the mother and the child, but such actions would be deemed clear violations of applicable law by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

It is very important for both mothers and employers to understand these rights. Here are some of the applicable laws which cover pregnancy.

1. PDA: The Pregnancy Discrimination Act (PDA) prohibits discrimination against employees and applicants on the basis of "pregnancy, childbirth and related medical conditions." Any employer that's subject to Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (i.e., has 15 or more employees) must comply with the PDA. The pregnancy discrimination law requires employers to treat pregnant employees the same as other employees on the basis of their ability or inability to work.


2. FMLA: When an employee becomes pregnant, employers must consider her right to take Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA). The FMLA provides up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave. To qualify for FMLA leave, an employee must have worked for the same employer for at least 12 months (not necessarily continuously) and clocked at least 1,250 hours of service (slightly more than 24 hours per week) during the 12 months leading up to FMLA leave. Any organization with 50 or more employees working

within a 75-mile radius of the work site must comply with the FMLA. Fathers are entitled to FMLA leave as well following the birth of a child.

3. ADA: A normal pregnancy is not considered a disability under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). But if a woman experiences pregnancy related complications that substantially limit a major life activity, she may be considered disabled under the ADA. The mother's rights under the ADA would include things such as reasonable accommodations which would still allow her to perform her job, or leave from work for a certain period of time. All employers with 15 or more employees must comply with the ADA.

This article summarizes a few of the laws which may apply to a pregnancy related matter. The coordination of all applicable pregnancy laws can be difficult. It is best to have an attorney familiar with these laws assist the employer and employee to ensure that all legally required leave is being offered.





Avera Simulation Lab: Coming to Presentation College

Great news from the Presentation College campus, where construction begins soon on a new facility that will revolutionize the way nursing and allied health students learn the skills necessary to succeed in healthcare careers.

The Avera Simulation Center is made possible through a \$1 Million dollar gift from Avera Health and a \$500,000 gift from an anonymous donor. Work on the state-of-the-art Center will begin over the holiday break and project plans call for completion in the summer of 2017. Students will begin learning in the Center next fall semester.

The new Center will offer the most advanced technology available for healthcare training and education. It will feature five rooms with hospital beds, specialized equipment, and interactive mannequins. The sections will simulate scenarios in the areas of Trauma, Critical Care/Intensive Care, Medical/Surgical Unit, Pediatrics, and Obstetrics/Delivery.

Dr. Margaret Huber, Presentation College President, and Mr. Todd Forkel,

CEO and Regional President of Avera St. Luke's Hospital, made the announcement at a special press conference with College students and faculty, hospital administrators and Presentation Sisters in attendance.

"Through the Presentation Sisters, Avera shares a similar heritage with

Presentation College and a similar sense of mission to serve the people of this region," Mr. Forkel said. "We're proud to partner with Presentation College on training future health care professionals."

Dr. Sandra Welling, Dean of Nursing at PC, said "Our students and their future patients are



going to benefit from this simulation center, which will allow our students to hone their skills in a safe environment and practice real-world scenarios all while increasing confidence, clinical knowledge and team collaboration."

Dr. Huber thanked Avera Health for their support, saying "We are excited to make this project, which we have envisioned for a long time, a reality."

In a Pinch

People are feeling pinched right now, caught between rising household costs and stagnant - or in some cases, falling - wages.

In recent weeks, we've learned that healthcare premiums under Obamacare are

once again set to rise - this time, by a staggering 25 percent nationwide.

And it's not just healthcare costs. The Obama administration's motor-vehicle rules are expected to push the price of a new car up by nearly \$3,000 over the next decade. The cost of common household products including fluorescent lamps, microwaves, air conditioners, and dishwashers - are also set to rise by around \$1,600 per household as a result of onerous regulations. Meanwhile, regulatory-related expenses are now

responsible for almost 25 percent of a new home's final cost. And if you're looking for a break on the utility costs, the administration's latest environmental push promises to skyrocket energy hills

At the same time, our economy remains at a standstill. According to a recent Bureau of Economic Analysis report, America's real GDP grew an average of just one percent during the first two quarters of 2016. That has a real impact on families. By some estimates, the prolonged economic stagnation has cost the median American family a total of \$69,000 in lost income over the last eight years.

People need relief on both sides of the equation. To help reduce a family's weekly expenses, regulatory reform should be one of the first federal policy changes. One proposal I've backed, the REINS Act, would introduce more accountability into the regulatory system, requiring that any major regulation is reviewed and approved by Congress before it takes effect.

This is just a start. Repealing big-government mandates, including Obamacare, and replacing them with consumer-driv-

en approaches would also help cut your monthly bills.

Just tackling expenses, however, won't be enough. Families need their incomes to rise as well. Through a tax plan House Republicans proposed earlier this year, the economy could grow 9.1 percent over the next decade, according to the nonpartisan Tax Foundation which also found that Americans of every income group would pay less in taxes under the plan. This growth, fueled by a simpler and fairer tax code, would help raise Americans' wages and create an environment where 1.7 million jobs could be created.

Additionally, investing in job-ready training for young people and opening new markets around the world for products grown or made in America could also help increase employment and incomes, while securing our borders can help protect opportunity at home.

It almost doesn't matter where I am or who I'm talking to, people feel like they're constantly being hit from all sides. Virtually everything seems to cost more, but few people are making more. We know how this can be resolved: the unnecessary mandates and regulations must be lifted while we create opportunities in the economy for incomes to rise. If we can do that, we can relieve the pinch all too many families feel today.

Finishing Strong and Looking Ahead

I've worked hard over the last two years delivering on my promise to help get the Senate working more efficiently and effectively for the people of South Dakota. Because when hard-working taxpayers ask themselves if Washing-

ton is listening - if Washington is paying attention to their struggles - I want them to know the answer is yes, loud and clear. An accountable government begins with accountable representatives, and my work in Washington is committed to that end.

One of the most effective and gratifying ways for me to be responsive to South Dakotans is to fight for policy initiatives that correct problems they've encountered or help avoid those problems from happening again

in the future. The work I've done to help prevent future out-of-control prescribed burns is a good example.

The Pautre fire was supposed to be a small 100-acre prescribed burn in Western South Dakota. And while prescribed burns can be an effective land management tool, this particular fire did far more harm than good. Because of unsafe fire conditions, the fire quickly grew beyond the U.S. Forest Service's (USFS's) control and torched 16,000 acres of public and private land and destroyed millions of dollars of property along the way.

Thanks to legislation I authored, the USFS will now be required to consult with state and local officials - the people who know the land better than anyone else - prior to starting a prescribed burn in South Dakota or any other state when fire danger is extreme and conditions are unsafe. It's a common-sense idea that will have a real and meaningful impact on ranchers and property owners with property

adjoining or near USFS land.

Another good example is my nearly year-long fight to ensure South Dakota schools that depend on the Impact Aid program didn't face hundreds of thousands of dollars in funding cuts, which would have had a negative effect on the students those schools serve. I teamed up with a bipartisan group of senators whose states would have also faced massive funding cuts to correct an error in the law and protect these schools and students.

These are just a few items Congress tackled in December during the final days of the 114th Congress, and there are a lot more wins where these came from. We've been able to get a lot of big things over the finish line over the last few years, and in the areas where there's more work to do, I'll keep my nose to the grindstone, continuing to work hard to deliver the positive results South Dakotans want and expect in 2017 and beyond.





2017 Capital Projects

City Ordinance 04-04-04 was adopted in 2004 to establish a second penny sales tax to provide an annual funding source to meet the City's major capital improvement needs. The second penny sales tax is expected to generate approximately

\$8,500,000 in year 2017. Twenty six percent of these tax dollars (approximately \$2,300,000) annually is

pledged towards bond payments on approved prior projects. These prior projects include the following: library, public safety building bond, aquatic center, ARCC improvements, city hall renovation and old federal building upgrades. Furthermore, approximately fifty percentage of these dollars are annually spent on needed infrastructure improvements.

Major infrastructure improvements programmed for 2017 include the reconstruction of the bridge on 3rd Avenue SE, the construction of two storm water ponds (S. Merton and N. Boyd) and continuation of the Kline Storm Sewer replacement pipe

installation adjacent to the Barnett Center. The city also expects to spend approximately \$2,500,000 for street repairs and maintenance.

These repairs and maintenance projects include chip sealing, asphalt patching, necessary curb and gutter replacement, and needed concrete road repairs. A splash from the past in chip sealing may occur in parts of the city with the reutilization of the pink quartzite rock to be placed on various streets. In closing, the new library construction is expected to be done by July 31, 2017.






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
