Housing Permits and the Local Economy

The housing market is generally seen as one of the first economic indicators to rise or fall with economic conditions, and housing permits can be an early indicator of activity in the housing market. With this in mind, I thought it would be

interesting to see the hard numbers on Aberdeen's recent past and present residential building permits. Here is the data, provided by the City of Aberdeen's Planning and Zoning

Department:


- 2014 total residential building permits (single and multi-family): \$7,623,040
- 2015 total residential building permits: \$11,570,418
- 2016 total residential building permits: \$8,605,691
- 2017 total residential building permits: \$10,185,630
- 2017 residential building permits, January-May: \$2,553,544
- 2018 residential building permits, January-May: \$2,780,265

This is reassurance that the residential market is strong right now in Aberdeen. Even though material building costs are up about 20% from this time last year, and interest rates

are as high as they've been in five years, good things continue to happen in developing more single family and multi-family units in the Hub City. One example is the recent announcement of the newest HAPI development on North Dakota Street.

This is good news, not only for current residents but also for new residents moving to our community. It's also good for other businesses, as new residential housing construction can lead to increased demand for products that these home buyers will need (appliances, furniture, etc.). This ripple effect through the local economy means increased prosperity for our community as a whole.

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NSU is Undergoing a Massive Transformation

In addition to building projects, we're transforming recruitment efforts and enhancing the student experience. Here are a few examples of what we're doing.

Enhanced intramurals program

With the

addition of the Athletic and Recreation Fields, we can now offer our students (and students from the South Dakota School for the Blind and Visually Impaired) access to this athletic facility.

• Lights over the soccer field will allow for late evening intramural matches as well.

Expanded on-campus restaurants

• By this fall, Einstein Bros. Bagels will include a Caribou Coffee - a place where coffee and fresh-baked bagels will live together under one roof.

 Papa John's Pizza and Provisions on Demand (P.O.D.) Market will both be in the new Great Plains East residence hall, opening this fall. We know these locations will be highly frequented by our students - perhaps even community members (though pizza delivery will not be available).

Revamped WolfPACT scholarships

• This summer we will announce a revamped WolfPACT scholarship program, which will take into account high school GPA as well as ACT scores. We have data showing high

school grade point average is the single best predictor of a student's success in college - and using the two factors together is an even stronger predictor.

Continued focus on retention

• With a lot of attention on attracting more students to Aberdeen and Northern.

we cannot overlook the importance of retaining those students. Last year, Northern's freshmen to sophomore retention rate hit a 15-year high - 77 percent. We aspire for an even higher rate, which is due in part to everyone on campus focusing on our students' success.

A quick update on our building projects: Our two new residence halls. Great Plains East and West, are on schedule to open this fall. These 299 new beds will replace Jerde Hall, which will be demolished sometime this summer or early fall. The Athletic and Recreation Fields are also coming along; fall practice for our athletic teams begins in August. The Regional Science Education Center is set to open for fall 2019. This new building will be the gateway to campus as you head south on State Street.

Alumni who travel back for homecoming will be surprised to see how much campus has changed in just one year!

Our capital campaign and campus improvements have earned a lot of attention, and rightfully so. However, it is important to realize that the student experience is a holistic effort – an effort that everyone on campus contributes to, as does the entire community of Aberdeen. Full- or part-time employment, outdoor activities, places to eat and shop, and entertainment opportunities are important factors that contribute to the overall enrollment and retention of students.

We are grateful that Aberdeen offers these things. Thank you for your support.

Stay Hydrated as the Heat Climbs!

The hot weather hit far too soon this year (do we ever get Spring anymore?), and as usual, it may have caught some of us off guard. No matter how quickly hot weather sets in (and of course, how long it stays), it's important to stay on top of taking care of yourself and your loved ones as we

enjoy the great outdoors now that the sunny season has arrived. The primary thing you can do to avoid heat-related illness is to stay hydrated—and water is your best choice. A good rule of thumb is to always shoot for half your body weight in ounces at a minimum—and higher for hot days when you are outside a great deal. As an example, a 150 pound person would shoot for 75 ounces per day or more. If you aren't a water fan, or struggle to get your

ounces goal in—here are a couple tips you can use:

Use a container that's marked with your goal throughout the day. Use a 25 ounce water bottle and aim to fill it twice during your work day and once or twice while at home.

Utilize fresh fruit, herbs, and essential oils to add flavor to water and encourage the thirst factor to kick in. Popular combos are lemon-lime, cucumber and berry, or mint and melon. You'd be surprised how much



flavor you get by adding these fresh ingredients, and there are some great water bottles with built-in infusers that make this simple.

The NSU School of Business began offering the minor last fall, a culmination of student interest

in the area of human resources and management, the demand for human resource professionals, and the importance for employees to understand employee relations.

"The School of Business believes the new Human Resource Management minor will offer students a broader understanding of how to utilize human capital," said Dr. Kristi Bockorny, assistant professor of management. "Many organizations utilize strategy to determine the best ways to recruit employees, train and develop those employees, and to retain the good employees. It is advantageous for companies to figure out who the right people are to hire and how to ensure that the right people stay with the organization. The Smoke Screen Offered by Avera St. Luke's

Join us at the K.O. Lee Aberdeen Public Library on Thursday, September 6, for a free informational session on a screening program offered by Avera St. Luke's Hospital for smokers or former smokers. Hear from our panel of Avera experts on St. Luke's low-dose CT screening program, and how it may benefit you. The event will be held on Thursday, Sep. 6, at 6 p.m. and refreshments will be served.

It may not be a surprise that people who smoke are at the greatest risk of lung cancer. But with early detection, such as the screening, there is an improvement in the survival rate. One of the primary factors is that lung cancer sufferers do not always have noticeable symptoms. That is why Avera St. Luke's Hospital offers the screening program designed to identify issues – before symptoms are noticeable.

Lung cancer is the second most common cancer in the United States and is the number one cancer killer in the U.S. causing more deaths than breast, prostate and colorectal cancers combined. Patients who are at high risk for lung cancer can get a screening through Avera St. Luke's Hospital to help improve survival rate.

Results of the National Lung Screening Trial (NLST) showed that screening current and former heavy smokers with at least three low-dose CT scans reduced their risk of dying from lung cancer by 20 percent. Testing for a disease when there are no symptoms with Low-dose CT screening of the chest may find lung nodules that may be early lung cancer. Eligibility is based on the National Comprehensive Cancer Network guidelines.







Healthy Hometown Walking Audit

Members of the Aberdeen Chamber's Health & Wellness Committee and local community leaders, along with three representatives from Wellmark Blue Cross Blue Shield, took part in a walking audit in



Aberdeen on Wednesday, June 13th. The audit was part of the MOVE MORE piece of Wellmark's Healthy Hometown program. The other components are EAT WELL and FEEL BETTER. The purpose of the audit was to discover what works well and what doesn't for pedestrians, bicyclists, strollers, wheelchairs and more when it comes to feeling safe while navigating our city streets and sidewalks. Work will continue on this project through 2018.



Healthy Hometown is a community health improvement initiative offered by Wellmark at no cost to South Dakota communities. Wellmark consultants help communities identify what areas they would like to improve, then assist in designing a plan to achieve those goals.

NSU/Mike Miller Elementary School Partnership Strengthens Education

Mike Miller Elementary School (MME), a kindergarten through grade 5 building, is in its second year of operation within the Aberdeen School District. It serves roughly 240 students, and while it may appear to be a typical elementary school from the outside, MME offers several unique characteristics and programs to its student population on the inside. One of these programs is the partnership it shares with the Northern State University's Millicent Atkins School of Education. This partnership allows teacher candidates the opportunity to become fully immersed in an elementary school setting and culture, where they not only partake in necessary coursework for their teacher education program but also engage in a clinical type of experience within the elementary school setting. This partnership has positive effects on the teacher candidates' overall teacher preparation experience, and it also enhances the educational experiences of the students and staff of MME.

"Just being at MME made our experience great. The overall volume of opportunities was amazing. We were able to see so many different things in each of the classrooms through our MME/NSU partnership, and it added so much more to our experience," said Breanna Hauge, NSU teacher candidate.

Through this program, MME students have engaged in Makerspace opportunities provided by the Northern State University teacher



candidates, whole-class and small group vocabulary lessons, and one-on-one tutoring during writing lessons and research projects. The teacher candidates have also assisted with MME's classroom iPad initiative, which has been piloted at the school for the past two school years. This assistance has provided a more enhanced educational technology implementation, which benefits the elementary students and staff, as well as the teacher candidates.

"The NSU Teacher Candidates helped my class with a biographical research project. The Teacher Candidates jumped right in and worked one-on-one with my students to research American Heroes. They challenged my 4th grade students to think critically about the sources, asked questions about the information, and kept them focused on the research project. There is no way that I could've given my students that kind of



one-on-one attention – it truly made the research project a huge success. The NSU Teacher Candidates' help enhance my students' learning very much!" said Bailey Mohr, MME Grade 4 Teacher.

To date, eighty-eight teacher candidates have experienced the NSU/MME partnership in thirteen classrooms over the past two school years.

"It helps having NSU here for our projects because we get the one-on-one attention we need. Our teacher can't always answer all of our questions at the same time, so it helps having them work with us," said a MME Grade 4 Student. "They really helped me with Tynker and Makerspace, so I can code better now." said another MME Grade 4 Student.



Why Every Business Owner Needs to Know Their Numbers

For me, a big red flag is waved when a business owner says "I pay my accountant/ bookkeeper/tax preparer' to handle that." Don't get me wrong, those advisors are very important. However, business owners need to take ownership

of their numbers. If they don't, their business will not thrive and, in some cases, may not even survive.

I am not advocating that you take on all the duties of tracking your numbers, but you need to be able to read the reports and know whether they make sense, even if numbers are 'not your thing.' If this is an

intimidating prospect, the SBDC can help be your guide. You can also find a resource in your accountant or a fellow business owner. The key is to start, to take baby steps. Start with learning what income and expenses show up in what categories (or should), then define a few benchmark metrics that are key to your business and track those on an ongoing basis, next compare numbers between period (month to month, year over year, etc.) and before you know it, you'll be able to analyze your full financial statements.

Why does your business life depend on it? If you don't know your know numbers, you won't see trends that may indicate the need for changes in your operation. You will find it more difficult to borrow money for growth if your financial reports are not in order. Poorly prepared and

managed financials will limit your ability to sell your business. Lack of understanding may limit your ability to make the right decisions for the business.

Think of it this way: When you have a plan and direction you want to take your business that should set an expectation of what your sales and expenses should be to accomplish that plan. With that expectation in hand, it is much easier to look at your actual numbers and see if they are in line with those expectations. Don't wait till the end of the year. Strive to review numbers on a monthly basis. The key is to START.

Promotion Fund Explained

periodically approached about the workings of the promotion fund. The promotion fund is rather unique because this fund isn't part of the general operations of city. The City of Aberdeen self-imposes a municipal sales tax upon the gross

receipts of all leases or rentals of hotels, motels, campsites or other lodging accommodations, alcoholic beverages, eating establishments and admission for entertainment for the promotion and advertising of a municipality. These monies collected under this self-imposed tax are placed in a special revenue fund commonly called "The Promotion Fund." Each

municipality that imposes this optional tax may determine what qualifies as promoting their municipality. The Office of the Attorney General, State of South Dakota, Official Opinion No. 84-46 dated 11-28-1984 infers 'Promotion" is a broad term and encompasses anything which contributes to the growth, enlargement or prosperity of something else or otherwise furthers, encourages or advances the same. You can surmise based upon the above definition of promotion the actual uses could vary from community to community. City records show the actual promotion taxes collected in 2007 was \$721.814 and the most recent estimate projected for 2019 is \$1,144,000.

The city council allows organizations to compete each year for promotion monies. The promotion fund process and application is posted to the city website in early May of each year. Applicants competing for 2019

funds were required to submit their applications by May 25, 2018. Eligible organizations must be classified under IRS Chapter 501 @ as a charitable, religious, or other nonprofit organization or a governmental subdivision or agency.

An organization that requests \$50,000 or more must provide their most recent current audited financial statement. The request for funds has become quite competitive and the request typically exceeds the available dollars by at least twenty-five percent. The number of applicants usually exceeds thirty per year. The smallest dollar amount request for 2019 was \$2,000 and the largest request was \$436,000. The Aberdeen City Council will determine the yearly allocation for 2019 promotion fund monies by June 30, 2018.

Things You Should Not Say During a Job Interview

orientation, national origin, religion, marital status, having children, pregnancy, or planning to start a family.

While you may know not to ask direct questions on these topics, you can still get into legal trouble through small talk that accidentally reveals information on a prohibited topic. If you later decide not to hire the candidate, he or she could then file suit for discrimination. Below are examples of questions you can ask, and questions to avoid, during an interview.

Ethic Background:

Questions like, "Were your parents born here?" or "What's your ethnicity?" can lead to legal trouble. What you can ask: "Are you authorized to work in the US?" or "What languages do you speak, read, and write fluently?" or "Can you show proof of citizenship/visa/alien registration if we decide to hire you?"

Pregnancy and Family: Even if it is obvious that a candidate is pregnant, it is never acceptable to ask any questions about the subject.

And, do not volunteer information about your maternity policy unless the candidate asks. You must also avoid questions related to the candidate's children. What you can ask: "Are you able to perform all the job functions as I've described them?" or "Do you have any upcoming commitments that would interfere with the schedule we've discussed?".

Other good questions are: "Do you have any limits on the hours you're available to work?" or "Are you available to work overtime?"

Age: Even innocent questions such as "What year did you graduate?" or "What year were you president of your fraternity?" can be illegal if it elicits information that tells you the candidate is over 40 years of age. What you can ask: "Are you a

member of any professional organizations now?" or "What skills/subjects learned in college would benefit you in this position?"

Marital Status: Innocent conversation starters about a person's spouse would be perfectly appropriate in a social setting, but not in an interview. If the person volunteers that they just got married or will soon be married, you may offer congratulations, but then move on to another topic. What you can ask about marriage: Nothing. The only safe question even close to this topic is "We would like to check your references. Have you worked under another name?"

Religion: Most employers know you can never ask about a candidate's religion. However, you should also avoid "What are you doing for the holidays?" This seemingly innocent question intrudes on a candidate's personal beliefs, and is dangerously close to a question about religion. What you can ask: "Are there any days or times when you cannot work?"

You must further ask this of all candidates, not just ones you think might have religious conflicts.

Disability: While it may seem acceptable to ask if a candidate has any disabilities or work restrictions, this type of question can suggest discrimination based on your perceived inability to perform the job due to a physicality. Instead, you may ask all candidates the same questions about the required functions of that job, such as: "Can you stand for 7 hours per day?" or "Are you able to lift 25 lbs on a regular basis?"

Arrests: The question "Have you ever been arrested or convicted of a crime?" has been a common interview question for decades, and still appears on some

job applications. However, the EEOC deems such questions illegal if it results in discriminating against minority candidates who may be over-represented in the criminal iustice system: especially if their criminal background has no relevance to the job duties. You should remove this question from

your applications. During the interview process, you can ask: "Have you ever been disciplined for violating a company policy?" or "Do we have your permission to run a pre-employment background check?" If conviction of a crime relates to a specific job duty, it is often safest to make an offer of employment conditioned upon passing a background check and to then explain why conviction of a crime directly relates to the position. The candidate is then free to explain convictions that may appear on that background check. After those discussions, you should consider if that type of conviction would actually impact the candidate's ability to perform the job.

"So, tell me about yourself.": These examples demonstrate why you should not start out a job interview with "So, tell me about yourself." What makes an interview question illegal is its potential for employment discrimination based upon the answer. This is why most illegal questions evolve from seemingly innocent questions we tend to ask in social settings. Job interviews can still be conversational. but it is best to stick to a small set of scripted questions that address the candidate's ability to carry out the tasks and responsibilities of the job. You should also document each candidates's answer to your questions. If you find yourself accused of illegal discrimination for failure to hire, a well documented interview file is your best defense.

No Matter the Call

I am incredibly grateful for the work of South Dakota's law enforcement officers. The job has never been easy, but with violent crime on the rise, a growing drug epidemic, and a looming mental health crisis, more is being asked of

our men and women in blue than ever before.

Between 2005 and 2015, South Dakota's violent crime rate doubled. Drug arrests are up. Aggravated assault and domestic violence is increasing. Sioux Falls has become more dangerous than Fargo, North Dakota, or Omaha, Nebraska. And people are feeling the impact. I hear all the time how our communities just don't feel like they did 15 years ago; they feel less safe.

When President Trump was sworn in last year, he brought his profound

respect for law enforcement into the Oval Office. Together, we've increased support for those in blue. For instance, we expanded Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) grants, which are used for hiring and training police officers and have provided \$13 million in funding to South Dakota law enforcement in the last five years.

In South Dakota, much of the drain on our resources comes from a growing drug epidemic. In recent months, Governor Daugaard declared that meth use in South Dakota was at epidemic levels. Opioid abuse is on the rise as well. While I believe prevention is key, I introduced a set of bills to strengthen families during drug addiction treatment and amplify efforts to prevent the child abuse and neglect that can result from drug use.

Additionally, I'm working to cut off drugs at their source. President Trump's border wall is critical to stemming illegal drug trafficking, and I've voted to fully fund his proposal. I'm also working on legislation to crack down on Mexican drug traffickers and

those who help facilitate their illicit activities at the border.

Moreover, we need to fix the quirks in the law that make law enforcement jobs harder, which is what my CUFF Act intends to do. The bill is commonsense: it prohibits individuals with outstanding felony warrants or parole violations from receiving certain Social Security benefits. It's not only unfair to ask taxpayers to pay people who are fleeing the law, but it's selfdefeating to subsidize someone's attempt to shirk law enforcement. As Staci Ackerman, Executive Director of the South Dakota Sheriffs' Association said, the bill would "limit [a wanted felon or parole violator's] ability to avoid justice using taxpayer dollars to evade capture." This bill was passed in the House and is awaiting a vote in the Senate.

Each of these tools aim to help law enforcement do their job better and more safely. This, in turn, helps ensure South Dakota remains a safe place for families and businesses to thrive.

Big Wins for the American People

While Senate Democrats have done everything they can to delay and obstruct the president's nominees to the executive and judicial branches, we've continued to plow ahead,



How Much Do Kids Know About Our State's Number One Industry?

In April, 550 fourth-grade students from the Aberdeen area touched a bit of agriculture at the Ag Fair hosted by the Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce Ag Committee.

That special day is just part of the way that young people

learn the importance of agriculture. Each day products grown in the state are consumed by those young and old. Understanding where food comes from is an important part of education that sometimes gets lost in the shuffle.

In the past year, the South Dakota Agriculture in the Classroom reorganized to provide a pilot program featuring the "SD Road Trip: Exploring South Dakota's Agriculture and History" to schools across the state. This interactive digital program challenged students in 46 fourth grade classrooms in 11 school districts.

Signup for the next school year for the SDAITC - SD Road Trip resulted in: 5,657 4th grade students, 218 teachers, 82 school districts with 255 classrooms (estimated) for the first enrollment period, May 31. A second SDAITC - SD Road Trip enrollment period opens when the new school year begins.

I visited one of the schools that uses the Road Trip. Students in Mrs. Bailey Mohr's classroom at Mike Miller Elementary School enjoyed the sessions that wove history, geography and agriculture together. In one lesson, the kids actively learned how homesteaders sought the best land for their farm, looking for water, fertile soil and protection from the elements. Through the use of iPads, the students follow the lessons enhanced by their teacher. This day they visited Sisseton, then moved to De Smet. Stops explored why those locations appealed to settlers. I was impressed with the eager responses to the prompts. They learned that sod is the upper layer of soil that is made up of grass and plant roots. Livestock means farm animals that are kept and/or raised by people. Simple but important words for those living in this state.

SD Road Trip fulfills the education standards demanded by classroom teachers, school administrators, and education leaders.

The Sioux Fall based, nonprofit Ground Works-Midwest knows that teachers need to understand the program. They worked with Northern State University to offer a one-credit



Agriculture in the Classroom teacher/ educator class. A teacher's tour June 21 gave the educators a chance to meet with producers and ag leaders for a "Day on the Farm."

At the Hefty Brother's Ag PhD Field Day in Baltic on July 26, SDAITC will provide continued opportunities for learning. The agri-themed gardens, Dirt Made My Bacon Cheese Burger & The Story of Corn show the plants in kid-friendly language. The gardens are examples of six agri-theme gardens plans and lessons available to schools. Several "hands-on" kid-friendly activities are provided by GWM/SDAITC, and several SDAITC partners

With a new SD Road Trip curriculum enrollment goal of 7,000 4th grade students, the hope to make SDAITC curriculum and programming accessible to every school district in SD is coming to fruition.

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
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
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PRIMROSE OF ABERDEEN NAMED RETIREMENT **COMMUNITY OF THE YEAR**

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
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
