

The Build Dakota Scholarship was created as a workforce initiative using a generous \$25 million donation from T. Denny Sanford and \$25 million match from the Future Fund Endowment. The scholarship offers full-ride scholarships to students

attending Lake Area Technical Institute, Mitchell Technical Institute, Southeast Technical Institute, or Western Dakota Technical Institute.

net assets are too high to qualify for scholarships based primarily on need and/or their academic achievement is sufficiently high to indicate a reasonable probability of success in college, but is no thigh enough to obtain scholarships based primarily upon the highest academic achievements."

Visiting Scholar Praises Teaching Methods at NSU

During his time as a visiting scholar at Northern State University, Professor Song Lei has gained an admiration for the teaching styles of professors at the NSU School of Busi-

Song said he was impressed with their patient, well-prepared, interactive approach.

"They love their students so much," he said.

Song is NSU's first visiting scholar from the University of Jinan, which is NSU's Chinese partner university with the Confucius Institute. Song's visit, which began in September, was hosted by the Confucius Institute at Northern State University.

"Overall, it's been a very positive experience for all parties involved, including NSU students," said Dr. Naomi Ludeman Smith, director of the Confucius Institute at NSU.


Ludeman Smith said the faculty from the School of Business and Song's flexibility as the first visiting scholar has helped the Confucius Institute shape the program. Having a visiting scholar on campus is a great example of the types of benefits that can happen with the collaboration between NSU and Jinan, she said.

Song is associate professor in the University of Jinan School of Management. His time at Northern has been spent furthering his research on training and evaluation of electronic commerce









talents, as well as learning Western teaching styles. In China, he said, students mainly listen to lectures. At NSU, he saw much more interaction and student participation.


"It's a style I want to learn," he

Song primarily worked with Drs. Allen Barclay and Doug Ohmer. As he learned from them, he also shared his own knowledge, offering feedback to students' business plans and giving a presentation on Chinese business practices to one class. He also contacted local business people to learn how U.S. businesses run.

As Song's visit nears its end, NSU prepares to welcome its second visiting scholar from Jinan, Dr. Zhao Jing. Zhao, a lecturer of English at the University of Jinan School of Foreign Languages, will teach a community Mandarin course beginning in late February as well as pursue her own area of study.

Song's advice for future visiting scholars includes: improve your English, because accents are different from the British English learned

in China; have a detailed schedule planned out before you arrive; and meet with multiple



Song said he will miss everyone when he leaves, and he plans to come back to NSU someday.

"I think the Confucius Institute is my family in America, really," he said.

But this is only the beginning in terms of international collaboration, he said. Song will share what he learned with students and faculty back home. Some NSU professors have expressed interest in visiting his university. He anticipates working with Barclay and Ohmer on an academic article comparing teaching and business methods in the U.S. and China.

"This is only the first step for me... and for the two universities," he said.





Secretary's Minute: In the Secretary of State's office, we handle corporate filings, uniform commercial code filings, elections, and issuance of concealed carry weapon permits, among 325 other types of transactions. This past year our corporate filings and trademark registration numbers remained steady. We noticed a decline in the Uniform Commercial Code filings. Over the past five years, we have averaged 55,000 UCC filings per year, which peaked at 66,000 in 2014. In calendar year 2015, we experienced a decline in filings to 46,000, mostly due to the Ag economy. The requests for concealed carry weapons permits saw a dramatic increase at the end of 2015. We issued over 3,000 permits in the month of December which were more than double an average month. In the month of January, permits continue to increase as well. There are over 85,000 active permit holders in the state of South Dakota





Leadership Aberdeen was initially discussed by the Chamber's Board of Directors at its annual planning session in 1985 as a way to cultivate potential and emerging leaders. The program was launched at a press conference held in July of 1987 and the first class of 21 participants

graduated that year.

We hope you enjoy a look back at Leadership Aberdeen through the years. Oh, and in case you're wondering why this year's class is only the 29th, the 1989 and 1990 classes were rolled into one, making it only the 3rd class in 4 years.



1987 Leadership Aberdeen

The Inaugural class of Leadership Aberdeen consisted of 21 local men and women and kicked off in the fall of 1987. Sessions included presenters such as Mayor Tim Rich, Lars Herseth and other community and business leaders. They discussed the current and past Aberdeen power structure and how it operates, as well as other areas of politics.

Governor William Janklow was the featured speaker at the graduation ceremonies and urged graduates to look to the future and to assume various roles of responsibility saying "It's what you want to make out of things that really makes the difference." Paul Darling was chosen to speak on behalf of the class and encouraged each to help spur Aberdeen's growth and prosperity. Diplomas were presented by Chamber Board President Terry Baloun and Executive Vice President Rex Hammond.

Hot Topics in Employment Law for 2016

A new year has begun and, once again, changes are enforced upon all of us, whether we welcome it or not. Last year, several federal government agencies warned that they will be ramping up their efforts to monitor employers in 2016. The United States

Department of Labor is one agency following through on their threat, making significant changes to regulations covering overtime exemptions and the classification of employees as contractors. Having represented employers faced with federal investigations, I am aware that they can be exhaustive, lengthy, and expensive. Employers would be wise to familiarize themselves with these issues and audit their practices before they fall under the watchful eye of a government investigator. The following are

two examples of the most targeted areas:

Federal Overtime Exemptions:

One of the biggest mistake I see in my law practice is an employer's misclassification of employees as "exempt" in an effort to avoid payment of overtime. A common exemption is the "highly compensated employee", which previously established that an employee paid at least \$100,000 would be generally exempt from payment of overtime wages. One recent change raised that minimum salary amount to \$122,000 per year, wisely prompting many employers to reevaluate those positions and all exemptions.


Increased Attention to Misclassification of Employees as Independent Contractors:

In 2015, the United States Department of Labor published their interpretation of the law, which makes clear its intention to discover and curtail misclassification of employees as independent contractors. The

federal agency emphasized its view that most workers are employees, not contractors. If an employer's classification of a contractor is deemed improper, the employer faces exposure for unpaid wages, double damages, interest, penalties, and attorney's fees.

I suspect that many people reading this article have already determined that a small business from South Dakota will escape the Department of Labor's scrutiny, believing only large companies are at risk. This is a mistake. Recent statistics reveal that the Department of Labor is actually targeting small businesses and various low wage industries. In fiscal year 2015, the Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division collected about \$74,000,000 in back-wages owed to 102,000 employees in the agriculture, day care, restaurant, health care, hotel and motel, janitor, and temporary help sectors. Proceeding under the belief that oftentimes the best defense is a well-planned offense, I advise all employers to conduct an audit of their employees to ensure compliance with all these regulations through a professional well versed in this area of the law.

Fewer Students Enrolling in College

There is a paradox regarding high school graduates and university enrollment. The latest national data indicates that while more of our young people are graduating high school fewer are enrolling in college. Largely because of increased persis-

tence rates made by disadvantaged students, slightly over 82% of high-school seniors in 2013-2014 graduated, up from 81% the year before. In fact, the graduation rate has increased annually over the last few years

In contrast, data from the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center indicates that for the fourth consecutive year, college enrollment rates have decreased. The number of students enrolling in colleges and universities is 1.7% lower this year than last. The percentage of high-school graduates who immediately enrolled in post- secondary institutions fell from 69% in 2008 to 66% in 2013, the last year for which we have data.

As most economists know and most college personnel have experienced, university enrollment is inversely related to the economy. When times are bad and jobs are scarce as in the Great Recession of 2008, attending university is an attractive option. It allows students to increase

their skill-set and become more marketable plus the opportunity for loans provides needed income albeit at a later cost. Conversely, increased workforce options as the economy recovers draws young people away from school and toward the immediate reward of a paying job.

For young people today, leaving aside the notion of self-actualizing and gaining new perspectives by attending college and instead looking at things from a strictly economic point of view, which is the better road to take – school or job? The answer to that question is – It depends. It depends on the industry and it depends on whether you are male or female.

Entry level jobs in blue-collar fields such as manufacturing, mining, and agriculture aren't traditionally associated with higher-education degrees. A new entrant can work their way up and eventually achieve or even beat the college wage premium – the income advantage of having a college degree. Unfortunately, this blue-collar pathway is almost exclusively a male

option. For women, the road to success requires transit through college. Service jobs such as housecleaning, waitressing, and secretarial services typically don't progress upward.

Even for

males, however, the non-college route is becoming increasingly less attractive. While a job may seem an appealing alternative to deferred income and the cost of tuition, the college wage premium has risen dramatically over the last 35 years. In a report issued last year, the Pew Research Center termed this "the rising cost of NOT going to college" (emphasis mine) as it concluded "On virtually every measure of economic well-being and career attainment – from personal earnings to job satisfaction to the share employed full time - young college graduates are outperforming their peers with less education. And when today's young adults are compared with previous generations, the disparity in economic outcomes between college graduates and those with a high school diploma or less formal schooling has never been greater in the modern era."

My advice to young people – Get a college degree. Does the major matter? Yes. More on that topic, next issue.

I moved to Aberdeen in late 2013 and knew no one. I'm pretty good at inserting myself into people's lives, so I figured I would have no problem making new friends here. I was wrong. While everyone in Aberdeen is incredibly friendly, no one

thinks to invite the new kid in town out for an evening with their group of friends.

After a few months of feeling a bit lonely and disconnected, I decided to start my own group and make new friends come to me! I started a group called StartHUB, focused on community building and networking for entrepreneurs. And while that has been growing and doing great, it's still not the group that would invite me to their yoga class or out bowl-

Through StartHUB I was meeting lots of people and especially people who were new to town or had just returned after a long time away. I was getting the oddest requests to hang out, usually starting something like this: "I know you're probably really busy, but would you want to..." or this: "I don't have any friends in town so would you be willing to hang out with me?" And of course I said ves, no one should feel ashamed to want to have friends or feel connected to their community, and every person I met was amazing in a different way. I remember a particular day that I had friend dates at 5, 6, 7, and important to business owners and 9 pm and realized that I was being selfish by not introducing all of these people to each other. So I started SocialHUB.

SocialHUB is a group that meets every Wednesday at 6 pm at the Brass Kettle for drinks, dinner, conversation or whatever. There's no

> agenda, it's not work related, we just get to know each other and we always end up hysterically laughing at some point in the evening. In addition to what we've started calling "Meet and Eat", we've gone ice skating and holiday shopping.


On the agenda for 2016 are bowling, a volunteer project with StartHUB to prep the space for a popup business going downtown, a summer camping trip out to the Black Hills, the South Dakota Film Festival and lots more as people think of fun ideas. The group is open



to anyone of any age (we've had people from 21 to 60 come.) It's a judgment-free zone because everyone is there for the same reason - to feel a part of something.

So why is a purely social group employers in town? In a word - retention. As employers, you give your transplant or returning employees a purpose for being in Aberdeen, but you only fill a portion of their day. What your employee does with those 5 to 7 left over hours each evening can make or break the decision for them to stay in town long term. And no employer wants to search for the same position every 2 to 3 years. I constantly hear employers talking about their favorite employees say "we just have to marry him or her off so that he/she won't ever leave us." In reality, it's a little more simple than that – provide meaningful work and connect newcomers with the community and you'll be surprised to see how many will want to stay in Aberdeen. For me personally, I had no intentions of staving in Aberdeen long term, but I found meaningful work, an ever-expanding group of friends and a sense of belonging in the community. I'm hooked.

The way I gauge the success of SocialHUB is not how many people show up every week, but how many people go home for the weekend and tell their old friends that they love living in Aberdeen. One of the women that sent me one of those shame filled text messages asking for me to be her friend went from "I can't wait to put in a year at my job and then get out of town" to "I'm thinking about buying a house here". That's when I know that SocialHUB has had an impact on the community.

Cash Flow Pitfalls

Perhaps you have heard the phrase "Cash is King". You may have also heard that a major reason for business failures is not having enough capital. The type of capital often missing is 'working capital', that is, cash available to

pay for day-to-day operations. Even profitable, successful businesses can suffer from cash flow problems. So what are the major causes of this small business challenge?

For new businesses with no history, it is easy to get in trouble if you have overestimated revenue or spent more than available on expenses or both. Forecasting is a tool that can help businesses set a budget for expenses and look at various revenue scenarios. Understanding what is needed to cover your expenses will help you be on alert when revenues are not meeting expectations or expenses are elevated so that changes can be made before the cash situation is critical.

Additionally, most businesses do not enjoy the process of collecting money from customers. First of all they may not take the time to put policies in place for offering credit to customers and they may not be consistent in billing for their products or services. And when customers don't pay, business owners may not put a high enough priority on making the call to collect. You can bet other businesses are calling and they are first in line to get paid. As they say, the squeaky wheel gets the grease.

One less obvious cause of cash flow struggles for businesses is an increase in inventory. Whether a business is actively buying new inventory or inventory just builds up over time, it takes cash to pay for that inventory. Again, businesses should have a plan for how much inventory they need and track inventory on an ongoing basis.

Even a profitable and growing business can have a cash shortfall if they experience a condition known as Fast Growth Syndrome. What, you can grow a business too fast? When a company is experiencing high growth, they typically need to buy more inventory. The higher sales in turn result in higher Accounts Receivables. If the time lapse between the inventory payment and the sales collection is too long, even a profitable company can find itself short on cash. And as they say, profits don't



pay the rent.

So, first do your homework and be aware of the potential cash crunches in your business. Commit to some basic tracking to watch for trends that could have a negative impact on cash flow. And lastly, it's never too soon to have a back up plan in place. Look into getting a line of credit for your business or check into the availability of vendor terms on inventory. The best time to get money is when you don't really need it.

The four principle work elements involved in the new plan are listed below.

Inventory: Gather quantitative, qualitative, and map data from a variety of sources. Completion of this work element will provide insight into the general physical, economic, and social context that will form the basis for all subsequent work.

Community Participation/Issue Identification: Actively involve the general public and key community interest groups in identifying key issues, establishing a vision for Aber-

deen, selecting a preferred growth scenario, and suggesting strategies to achieve that vision and scenario.

Alternative Analysis: This element includes the technical tasks to develop several alternative population, housing and employment projections and development scenarios.

Plan Development: The last work element is to include the technical steps to prepare the comprehensive plan to meet the requirements of South Dakota Codified Law and best serve the interest of the residents in the future.

I encourage those community minded people to step forth as we progress forward to design our future blueprint for Aberdeen.

Some of the most influential people in my kids' lives have been their coaches, and I think that's true for a lot of folks. All three of our kids have been blessed to be on teams led by incredible coaches who taught them

lessons they could use on and off the court. It's what a good coach does.

In 2014, we lost one of South Dakota's greatest coaches, Don Meyer. Coach Meyer served as head basketball coach at Northern State University in Aberdeen for 11 seasons. In 2009. he became college basketball's winningest coach, and by the time he retired, he clocked in more than 900 victories. Earlier this month, I had the opportunity to participate in a ribbon cutting for the Don and Carmen Meyer Center of Excellence at the Avera Cancer Institute in Aberdeen. It was an incredible honor to be there and recognize a coach that each of us could learn something from – whether we play basketball or not.

For those who may be unfamiliar with his story, Coach Meyer got in a terrible car accident in 2008 with injuries so significant that his lower left leg had to be amputated below the knee. During that surgery, they found cancer.

One of my favorite things he left behind was his "2nd Ten Commandments." His words offer incredible perspective for anyone battling a serious illness. Like so many of his lessons as a coach, however, these commandments could apply to each of our lives. I won't go through all of them in this column, but I did want to share a couple of highlights.

He started out his list with these two commandments: "Thou shall not worry, for worry is the most unproductive of all human activities. Thou shall not be fearful, for those things we fear never come to pass." We live in an ugly world and it's hard to not jump to worry and fear. Whether you or a family member is battling cancer, facing a job loss, or trying to change Washington, we ought to keep our focus on action, not fear. Our attention should be on what we have control over and the steps that can be taken to make a positive change.

Coach Meyer goes on to write in his fourth commandment: "Thou shall face each problem as it comes; you can only handle one at a time anyway." Advice each of us could use from time to time.

His seventh commandment: "Thou shall not try to relive yesterday for good or ill. It is forever gone; concentrate on what is happening in your life and be happy now." So many people today struggle with living in the now. We're constantly on our phones or social media. It takes us out of the moment. Put it all aside – if even for a few hours a day – and live in the now.

Coach Meyer's tenth commandment is my favorite: "Thou shall count thy blessings; never overlooking the small ones, for a lot of small blessings adds up to a big one."






